



# Filmmaking Memory Card Game

Match the members of the filmmaking team to the equipment they use. This game will test your knowledge of film careers, your concentration... and your memory!

## How to play the game

- **1.** Cut out all of the cards and give them a good shuffle.
- 2. Choose how many pairs of cards to include in your game, up to eight pairs.
- 3. Lay them face down in rows on the table.
- **4.** Player one turns over any two cards.
- 5. If the two cards match, they get to keep them.

- **6.** If the cards don't match, the player has to turn them back over.
- 7. Both players should try to remember what was on each card and where it was!
- 8. Now it's player two's turn. Repeat steps 3-6.
- **9.** The game is over when all of the cards have been matched. The player with the biggest pile of cards wins!

### Job roles

#### **ANIMATOR**

Your work could be hand-drawn, stopframe or computer animated. Animation requires painstaking detail to capture every moment of your character.

#### **CAMERA OPERATOR**

You operate and look after all the camera equipment. You record the shots the director would like to use, making sure the camera is in focus and the shot is well framed.

#### **COSTUME DESIGNER**

You decide on the wardrobe and costumes for each character. Work with the stills photographer to take photographs of actors in full costume for continuity.

#### **EDITOR**

You edit all the scenes together to create a finished film. You will work with images and sounds to create a story using the storyboard as a guide.

#### **SCREENWRITER**

You write the screenplay (story and script) from which the film is made. You are responsible for researching, developing and writing the story, characters and dialogue.

## **CHIEF LIGHTING TECHNICIAN**

Also known as a Gaffer, you oversee all practical and technical aspects of the electrics and lighting to get the right effect.

#### HAIR AND MAKE-UP ASSISTANT

You design and create the make-up and hair for characters. This might include making an actor look much older than they are or creating cuts and bruises using make-up.

### STORYBOARD ARTIST

You draw a series of pictures to represent a script, working with the director to turn their vision into reality.
